Information for people accessing sex workers

When you call a sex worker

- Think about what you want before you call.

Are you looking for?

- ♦ *a massage*
 - ♦ *sex*
 - ♦ *massage and sex*
 - ♦ *mutual masturbation*
 - ♦ *other sexual acts*
- Do not be afraid to ask for the services you want.
 - Don't forget to discuss prices.
 - Not all services are available in your area.
 - Talk to staff at Magenta if unsure.

How much does it cost?

- Costs vary between sex workers.
- There are different costs for different services.
- Remember to ask the price before you book.
- Prices are available on some websites.

Where does sex work take place?

- In your home.
- In a hotel, brothel or parlour.
- Ask the sex worker.

What do I need to think about before I see a sex worker?

- Be clear about what you want.
- A sex worker provides a business service.
- Sex workers are not your girlfriend/boyfriend. This is a working relationship.
- If you have a specific disability and need extra support/assistance let the sex worker know when you book the service.
- ***Remember sex workers can choose who they want to provide a service to.***

Is it legal to access a sex worker?

- Yes, if you and the sex worker are 18 years old or older.
- It is OK for your parents or support worker to help you arrange an appointment with a sex worker if that's what you want.

- It is illegal to have sex in a public place.
- ***It is illegal to access a sex worker in a public place.***
- Condoms must be worn during sex.

How do I find a sex worker?

- Use the internet. Search for 'escorts'. You can also type in your suburb. Some listings will be for brothel workers and some will be for sex workers who work alone. Some will have photos.
- Local community papers under the 'Personals' section. These will also advertise visiting sex workers in regional and rural areas.
- Talk to staff at Magenta if unsure.
